Please let us know how we can help.

You are the key to making sure our youth prosper and advance in efforts to "Be Prepared". We are in an exciting time in Los Padres Council with an opportunity to leave a legacy that will last for the next 100 years. Join us for the adventure.

Santa Barbara Sheriff's Explorer Post #32 Recognized

The Santa Barbara Sheriff's Explorer Post #32 based out of Santa Maria participated in the 8th Annual Central Valley Law Enforcement Explorer Competition this past weekend. The competition, which was held in Ripon, California was comprised of 36 law enforcement explorer posts representing various California sheriff's departments, police departments, Border Patrol and highway patrol stations, as well as a police explorer post from the state of Utah. These youth explorers represented their agencies as they competed against one another in numerous scenariobased training events during the three-day event. Scenarios included criminal investigations, emergency situations and critical incidents encountered by law enforcement.


The Santa Barbara Sheriff's Office earned placement in the following categories: 1st place in driving under the influence of alcohol investigation; 1st place in traffic stop; 1st place in hostage rescue and 2nd place in a family disturbance/officer assault scenario.

The Sheriff's Explorer Program is a workbased program for youths 14-21 years of age. In addition to competitions throughout the year,

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Sheriff's Explorers participate in weekly public safety training, a law enforcement training academy, community-based events throughout the county and department related duties as needed. The program promotes personal growth through character development, a sense of community service and citizenship, physical fitness, leadership skills, communication skills, public speaking skills, command presence, career planning and more.

The Explorer Program has been a platform from which countless young adults have launched a successful career with local. county, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The program also offers numerous opportunities that meet the volunteer requirements of our local school districts Recruitment for the program is on-going. The Sheriff's Office currently has two Explorer posts, Post 32 based in North County and Post 830 based in South County. Updated Youth Protection Training Due 1 Oct.

Over the decades, the Boy Scouts of America has been a leader in developing training and policies designed to keep young people safe. Over time, these policies have become standard with organizations across the nation. Now, the Boy Scouts of America is releasing fully updated training to further strengthen our ability to protect youth.

These changes include:

- Updated Youth Protection Training, including insights from experts and survivors and the latest strategies for recognizing and preventing major forms of abuse. This is the designated Youth Protection Training for all adults. All volunteers must take the new training by October 1, 2018, no matter when they took the previous training.
- Effective June 1, 2018, adults accompanying a Scouting unit who are present at the activity for 72 total hours or more must be registered as a leader, including completion of a criminal background check and Youth Protection Training. The 72 hours need not be consecutive.
- An expanded ScoutsFirst Helpline to aid volunteers and families in addressing potentially dangerous situations.
- Unlimited counseling and support for healing to anyone who has ever been abused in Scouting.
- Youth Protection Training for youth members available in 2019.

Order of the Arrow

The Order of the Arrow has several events coming up for our members. For those who have not been elected to membership and completed the Ordeal, the Order of the Arrow is the National Honor Camping Society of the Boy Scouts of America.

During the first
week of August
several of our
members are
attending the National
Order of the Arrow
Conference (NOAC)

at the University of Indiana with about 10,000 other OA Brothers from throughout the country.

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This event consists of leadership instruction, ceremony and Indian dance competition, inter Lodge or Section sports, and patch trading. Leading our local contingent is Lodge Chief Joey Kamlet and NOAC Adviser Bob Murach.

The Summer Ordeal for new members elected in last winter's elections will be at Rancho Alegre on August 24-26. This is the last chance that those individuals will have to become OA members without have to requalify in next winter's election cycle. Registration is online at the Council's website. The Lodge will be performing several service projects to help prepare the camp for the construction projects that will begin this fall. The Lodge is committed to the rebuilding of the camp following the July 2017 Whittier Fire that destroyed 95% of the camp. Also, the August Ordeal is also the annual business meeting of the Lodge in which new officers for the upcoming year are elected.

The September Sectional Conclave will be at Camp Three Falls in Frazier Park on September 21-23. This gathering of members from six Southern California councils is a training and fun event for OA brothers. New Brothers (went through the Ordeal between August 1, 2017 and September 10, 2018) receive a \$10 discount at Registration. Los Padres Council website (www.lpcbsa.org) is the place to register for this event.

The Annual Banquet and Installation of new Lodge Officers is tentatively set for November 17th at Rancho Alegre. Earlier that day will be the Lodge Leadership Development. This program trains leaders on running meeting, Lodge programs and assets, and being better able to perform service for their Scout unit.

The Lodge received a matching funds grant from National OA for the rebuilding of the Xeriscape Garden at Rancho Alegre. This

project is on hold as the final plans for the camp have not been finalized. It is possible that the Garden will be in a new location. A request has been put into National to extend the completion date.

For those who have not donated \$10 for the special Lodge bear pin, we still have pins available. Funds from this program go to help the Lodge with its efforts to Rebuild Rancho Alegre.



WHAT IS WOOD BADGE?

Wood Badge is the next step beyond your basic Scout leader training.

In basic training, you learn position-specific skills, like how to be, say, a Cubmaster.

In Wood Badge, you learn how to be a leader.

Participants spend 6 full days (two-three-day weekends) learning modern leadership theories from contemporary scholars such as Ken Blanchard (author of the One Minute Manager), Stephen Covey (author of Seven Habits of Highly Effective People and Principle Centered Leadership) and Spenser Johnson (author of Who Moved My Cheese) to name a few.

You also learn by doing — working in a team, planning a project, solving problems, etc.

Participants then have 18 months to apply these skills in five different projects they choose.

The course fee covering both weekends is \$250. Participants must complete both weekends and the five projects (the "ticket") to receive course credit and the Wood Badge regalia.

- Learn the leadership and team dynamic skills developed in corporate America.
- Learn how to develop Scouting's values in your own life, as well as in your Scouts'.
- Learn how the skills you learn can apply to other aspects of your life.

Wood Badge Service Award

Celebrate the 70th anniversary of Wood Badge in the United States with a special award available only in 2018. The **American Wood Badge Alumni 70th Anniversary Service Award** can be earned by completing five of the nine requirements listed below. Think of this like a second, easier-to-complete Wood Badge ticket. (The actual Wood Badge ticket is a series of five projects that benefit local Scouting. After the in-person course, Wood Badgers complete these ticket items to receive their beads.)



American Wood Badge Alumni 70th Anniversary Service Award requirements

Wood Badgers will agree to and work a new ticket. To qualify for the award, individuals must complete five of the following nine requirements during the anniversary year — Jan. 1, 2018, to Dec. 31, 2018.

- 1. Register as member of the Scouting Alumni and Friends, at any level.
- 2. Attend a district, council or national level **training course** either as a participant or staff member OR serve as staff on a Wood Badge course.
- 3. Participate in a 70th Anniversary celebration in your Council such as a reception, reunion or other special acknowledgement at a Council wide event such as annual recognition or F.O.S. dinner.
- 4. Recruit another individual to attend and volunteer at a Boy Scout **training event** or Wood Badge service activity.
- 5. Share the values of Wood Badge and Scouting by recruiting an individual to take Wood Badge.
- 6. Promote Wood Badge training at a unit, district, council area, region or national event.
- 7. Contribute \$7 or \$70 or whatever larger amount you can to an existing council custodial fund for Wood Badge scholarships.
- 8. Solicit another individual to join you in contributing \$7 or \$70 or whatever larger amount they can to an existing council custodial fund for Wood Badge scholarships.
- 9. Become a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America at the unit, district or Council level. Consider such opportunities for service as: district committee, commissioner, roundtable staff, Alumni or NESA committees and more.
