Women of Character

Loralei "Skittles" Dawson Receives National Honor



Earlier this year, Boy Scouts of America under the leadership of former National Commissioner Ellie Morrison, launched a nationwide search to identify 5 young women to gather 5 female Eagle Scouts (and other program equivalents) who had greatly and positively impacted their communities through their Eagle Scout Projects, their work in Scouting in general, and their work outside of Scouting.

It is with great pleasure to announce that our very own Loralei "Skittles" Dawson (Troop 414 – Arroyo Grande) was one of the 5 outstanding young women selected to receive this honor. "Skittles" was recognized at the "Women of Character" event on July 21 – 23, 2023 at the Summit Bechtel Reserve in West Virginia, concurrent with the 2023 National Scout Jamboree. The "Women of Character" event was designed to foster thoughtful leadership, generate support for female-centric Scouting units across the United States, and ensure that young women have the opportunity to participate in the life-changing experiences that Scouting provides.

Below is a brief summary of "Skittles" Scouting journey taken from her nomination form as written by Troop 414 Scoutmaster, Jon McCoid.

On February 1, 2019, Troop 414 began its journey with the goal of providing girls with the same opportunities previously enjoyed only by boys in BSA. This moment was particularly significant to Loralei as her father is an Eagle Scout who shared his love of Scouting with all four of his children. As the oldest child (3 girls and 1 boy), she now had an opportunity to enjoy those same experiences and recognition and she leapt at it.

Her enthusiasm for breaking down barriers and encouraging others to be bold and adventuresome is contagious. She was 15 years old when she first had the opportunity to be a Scout and she hit the ground running! Accelerating rapidly through the leadership ranks, she led the other Scouts in our troop to pursue goals which may seem daunting to most people. She was unanimously elected to lead the Crew on our 12-day trek at Philmont and constantly shared her compassion and encouragement with everyone. She was fondly nicknamed "Skittles" because she is consistently a rainbow of joy and enthusiasm to those around her.

"Skittles" embodies the Values of Scouting in her everyday life and encourages those around her to be the best they can. She is forthright in her perseverance for taking on barriers created by discrimination and encouraging others to join her along the way. It should be noted that she was recognized by the Cuesta District of Los Padres Council as the "Scout of the Year" for her achievements in 2022.

She has an incredible toolbox filled with leadership skills, largely in teaching (EDGE Method), in support of her passions. Her love for the outdoors is on display as the optional merit badges she selected included Kayaking, Oceanography, Wilderness Survival, Geocaching and Backpacking. She also selected Music and Coin Collecting to share these hobbies with friends and family members. She is focused on her goals and Scouting clearly has given her opportunities to achieve anything to which she sets her mind.

New Set of Brother and Sister Eagle Scouts

Congratulations to Austin and Ashley Slicton.



In July of 2019, Austin Slicton earned the rank of Eagle Scout. In June of 2023, Ashley Slicton earned the rank of Eagle Scout. Los Padres Council would like to welcome a new set of brother and sister Eagles Scouts; both of them have had an amazing journey.

Austin started BSA as a Tiger in Cub Scout Pack 36 in Goleta, Ca. Austin later bridged to Troop 4 in Goleta, CA, becoming a very active Scout participating in almost every Troop meeting, event, outing and community service activities. Austin served several leadership roles including Senior Patrol Leader of Troop 4.

One of his favorite experiences on a Troop 4 outing was hiking across Catalina Island more than 50 miles on the Trans-Catalina Trail. Another favorite memory was when a bear came into Troop 4's Lake Lopez campsite in the middle of the night looking for the strawberries that were left in a container in a cooler on the table. Once the bear loudly opened the container and ate the strawberries he ran past Austin's tent into the forest. Austin's many adventures in scouting has taken him to all 4 of the BSA high adventure bases, which allowed him to earn the rare and coveted BSA Grand Slam award.

During Ashley's BSA journey, she has gone to several BSA summer camps, camporees, trainings, and most recently 2023 National Jamboree in West Virginia. Ashley enjoys scouting activities with her BSA Troop and helping the scouts with rank advancement so that one day they can also become an Eagle Scout. One of Ashley's favorite BSA memories has been attending 2023 National Jamboree and while there, riding the Big Zip, a half-mile long zip line soaring over the Summit Bechtal Reserve, white water rafting and patch trading.

Camp Rancho Alegre is Almost Ready





Program Updates

Scouters:

Coming out of a summer with great camp experiences for Cub Scouts and Scouts BSA Scouts, OA Ordeals, a National Jamboree trip, and more, programs have resumed this fall within the Los Padres Council!

Within the last two months,

- The Order of the Arrow (OA) held its summer induction (Ordeal) weekend
- Cub Scout Adventure Weekend was a success at Larsen Meadow
- Webelos Woods was held at Larsen Meadow, with roughly 30% of all of the Council's Webelos and AOL scouts in attendance
- Our Order of the Arrow Lodge attended the G18N Section Conclave down at Camp Josepho

The next few months have more training and on deck:

- IOLS and BALOO training will be held October 28 starting at 8am, finishing October 29 at 11am, in Arroyo Grande
- BALOO (Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation) is required for Cub Scout Packs to go camping
- IOLS (Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills) is required for a Scoutmaster or Assistant Scoutmaster to be fully trained, and will assist them in leading campouts and other advancement tasks
- November 4: The Order of the Arrow will be hosting its Lodge Leadership Development (a leadership training course for youth) and then its annual banquet, both at Rancho Alegre.

If you have taken BALOO or IOLS, there is still time to volunteer to be on staff. Contact Len Kamlet or Sean Tashma.

For the upcoming year, I also wish to ask all of our leaders (for all program levels) and our Scouts BSA Troops to plan to attend BSA's advanced training courses:

- Wood Badge, an adult leader training course, will be held this coming April. The in-person portion of the course is held over 5 full days on two weekends, April 12-14 and April 27-28. The course begins at 8am on the 12th and resumes at 8am on the 27th. We encourage every leader to attend, and hope that every unit sends at least one leader to the training. As someone who has taken the course and served on staff (and will be serving as next year's Course Director), it's among the best experiences you'll have as a leader, and the training applies for more than just your role in Scouting. This is the first course for our council in over 5 years, and I hope you'll join us. Register for the course at https://lpcbsa.doubleknot.com/registration/calendardetail.aspx?activitykey=3004210
- National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) will be held next June 24-29. We had great attendance, with more
 units sending youth than in recent years. Our staff is already starting to form (a mix of new and returning youth and
 adult leaders). We again are setting our goal for every unit with an eligible scout to send at least one scout to this
 training course.

Outdoor School Staff Housing

Knot of The Month: The Safety Knot




Because of the image above, some of you may believe that this month's article on "the safety knot" is about the bowline. Spoiler, the bowline on its own is not considered a safe knot by many rope access, rope rescue, and climbing organizations.

The bowline shown above has been made *safer* by the fact that the working end (short one near the loop) is tied off with a backup knot. There are a bunch of variations of backup knots, and in this article we will be looking at the double overhand as used as a back up knot. One benefit of the double overhand compared to other safety knots is that it can be used to make almost any knot safer.

To tie the double overhand as backup knot

- 1. Wrap the short end twice around the standing rope, working back toward the primary knot.
- Feed about a hand's length of rope through the loops you just made heading away from the primary knot.
- 3. Pull free end to tighten backup knot down onto standing line.



As a simple rule of thumb, if you need to lift something value (like a person), always finish the knot with a backup knot AND leave at least a hands length of tail on the short end.

And to be more specific since it is a matter of safety, the bowline is not a safe knot without a backup knot. The sheet bend is also not safe without a backup knot. And the square knot should never be used to join two ropes together. If binding an important load, the square knot should also have a backup knot.

Knot of the month: Den Leader Training Award



Adult leaders in the BSA have multiple opportunities to be recognized for their achievements and dedication to helping deliver outstanding programs to our youth. This recognition typically comes with a knot which may be worn on that leader's field uniform.


Trained leaders play a key role in being able to support our Cub Scout programs, and likely the most influential leader for our Cub Scouts is the Den Leader. Any Lion, Tiger, Cub (Wolf or Bear), or Webelos including Arrow of Light (AOL) den leader can earn after serving in their role and completing other requirements. A den leader training award can be earned multiple times, for each role held.

To earn this award, a leader must first take their position specific training for their position. In addition, they must serve as the den leader for one year. In addition, they must attend either a University of Scouting, or four Roundtables run by their district Roundtable Commissioner. Roundtables in the Los Padres Council are held the third Thursday of each month; a leader interested in earning this award should start now!

In addition, there is a list of 10 performance items, and a den leader must meet five of these. One is attending a Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation (BALOO) course. For those interested, we are hosting one this coming October 28-29 in Arroyo Grande, and hope to host a second one in late March. Go to the calendar on the council website to register, and look for more information in this month's Los Padres Press.

Once the requirements are met, an application form can be downloaded by going to https://filestore.scouting.org/filestore/training/pdf/511-052_WB.pdf and submitting it to the District or Council Training Chair.

Once earned, this knot – like any knot - is worn over the left pocket on the BSA field uniform, such that the bight in front of the standing part is to the wearer's right.



Not of the month: This is a Scouting Rule... NOT!

In this month's Myth-busting article, we are focusing on another common myth of Boards of Review.

True or False:

Board of Review members should test (or re-test) Scouts to make sure that they truly mastered all of the items they needed to learn or accomplish for each rank.

As the name of this article implies, this is NOT a BSA policy; the above statement is **False.**

Rules and guidance for Scouts BSA, Venturing, and Sea Scouts Boards of Review (BORs) are governed by the BSA Guide to Advancement (https://www.scouting.org/resources/guide-to-advancement/). The GtA is a useful tool for all aspects of advancement, including merit badges, the Eagle Scout Project, rank advancement for all programs, but for this article we are focusing on the BORs, primarily documented in section 8. [Section 4.4.2.3 documents the Sea Scouts BOR; Scouts BSA and Venturing BORs are covered within section 8.]

Within Section 8.0.1.0 ("Conducting the Board of Review"), Sub-section 8.0.1.1 is entitled "Not a Retest or "Examination". The title alone should make it clear that this is not the goal of a Board of Review. Within this section, it states "In most cases it should, instead, be a celebration of accomplishment. Remember, it is more about the journey. A badge recognizes what a Scout has done toward achieving the primary goal of personal growth. See "Personal Growth Is the Primary Goal," 2.0.0.3. It is thus more about the learning *experience* than it is about the specific skills learned."

So what can be asked about advancement and requirements, since one purpose (but just one of many) of the Board of Review (BOR) is to ensure the Scout met the requirements for rank? For starters, BOR board members can ask about the circumstances of some of the advancement: where did they earn a given merit badge? On which trip(s) did they cook for their patrol? What was their favorite knot or merit badge?

BOR members can and should also be asking about the program delivery as it relates to the achievements of the Scout. Did they feel they had a lot of opportunities for completing the requirements? Is the Troop holding enough campouts to let Scouts earn their camping nights, meals cooked, and other items? And, is there anything the Scout thinks the Troop can do better to help enable their fellow Scouts in their rank advancement?

Within the Guide to Advancement, there are a total of 12 references to the word "retest," and each reminds the reader that unit leader conferences and boards of review are NOT designed to retest the Scout.

If your fellow board members are attempting to retest your Scouts, gently remind them that their role is to help the Troop grow and serve to celebrate the accomplishments of the Scout and enable them to continue on their path in Scouting.

Not of The Month: Monthly Safety Moment

Along with our Knots of the Month, we want to share a "NOT" of the month, to remind our leaders that safety plays a central role in enabling our youth to have FUN and memorable experiences.

Answers to many safety questions in Scouting can be found in the BSA's Guide to Safe Scouting, and companion SAFE guidelines. SAFE here is an acronym:

Supervision

Assessment

Fitness and Skill

Equipment and Environment.

This month's NOT of the month focuses on the "E", and specifically the wearing of proper attire and proper equipment when participating in activities.

Whether it's a simple day hike, a cycling activity, or a water-based outing, ensuring proper attire and proper equipment should be at the top of any leader's list. Among the items to review, leaders should:

- Ensure safe and appropriately sized equipment in good condition for the activity. (e.g. helmets, personal flotation devices, boots)
- Check gear use for changing conditions that could affect safety.
- Confirm participants' clothing is appropriate for expected temperatures, sun exposure, weather events, and terrain.
- Ensure group safety equipment is available when applicable.

Mental, Emotional, and Social Health Planning Template for Councils

Mental, Emotional and Social Health (MESH) Planning Template for Councils-This template was developed to assist Councils in developing a plan for MESH issues that may occur at Council camps or events. It provides an overview of the components to consider in developing the steps leadership should take in the event of a mental health concern. While these mental health issues have a wide range-anything from homesickness to a mental health crisis-the time to develop a strategy for the best outcome is well before the camp or event occurs. NCAP RP-551 recommends that Councils have a network in place to respond to staff and camper mental, emotional, and social health needs. This template will help you in developing your Council plan.

Arrow of Light Den Camping Reminders

As with all Scouting activities, this participation must follow the policies of the Boy Scouts of America as outlined in the Guide to Safe Scouting. Here are a few helpful tips:

- It is not required for the Scouts to camp overnight. The troop event could be a campout or other outdoor activity such as an age-appropriate hike or other outdoor event. That is a decision the Arrow of Light den, the den leadership, and the Scouts BSA troop they are working with should make in collaboration. If the troop and pack do not share the same charter partner, the troop and pack/AOL den must receive permission from the council to hold the join activity.
- If the outdoor event is an overnight campout and the Arrow of Light Scouts are staying overnight, the Arrow of Light den must camp according to the specific camping guidance for Cub Scout found in the <u>Guide to Safe Scouting</u>. This includes:
 - 1. The den must have a BALOO trained adult leader in attendance.
 - 2. Webelos and Arrow of Light Den Camping: Each Scout should attend with their parent(s) or guardian(s). A Webelos or Arrow of Light Scout whose parent or legal guardian cannot attend a den overnight camping trip may participate under the supervision of at least two registered leaders. The leaders and a parent or legal guardian must agree to the arrangement, and all Youth Protection policies apply. Reminder, a Scout cannot share a tent with any adult other than their parent or guardian.
 - 3. Cub Scout youth may tent with a parent or guardian as outlined in Scouting's Barriers to Abuse.
- Scouting's Barriers to Abuse outline registration requirements for adults. AOL dens must have registered two deep leadership in attendance at the overnight event. Additional parents/legal guardians who also attend with their own child/legal ward may qualify for the registration exception indicated in Scouting's Barriers to Abuse so please review to determine applicability.
- What does it mean to "use the patrol method while on the outing"? First, engage the youth leadership of the troop you are collaborating with to find ways they can help the Arrow of Light Scouts in attendance see and experience the patrol method. There are many wonderful ways to use and see the patrol method during this event! Examples could include:
 - 1. Assign a member of the Arrow of Light den to serve as the "patrol leader" of their "Arrow of Light" patrol during the event.
 - 2. Provide the Arrow of Light den the opportunity to divide up chores or other necessary tasks to enable them to work together as a group to meet their group's goals.
 - 3. Showcase the patrol method through the Scouts BSA patrols in attendance at the event/activity so the Arrow of Light Scouts can see the value and fun that comes from participating in a patrol.
- Regardless of the activity, verify that your planned Arrow of Light "Scouting Adventure" aligns with the policies in the Guide to Safe Scouting, including whether the planned activities are approved for an Arrow of Light Scout to participate in. Check out the <u>Age Appropriate Guidelines for Scouting Activities</u> for a reference.
- Finally the "SAFE Checklist" is a helpful tool for your Arrow of Light den leaders and Scouts BSA troop youth leaders and adults to review and use as they plan for a successful event.

2023 "Camping Attendance Report" and 2024 NCAP Intent to Operate

It is time to submit your council's 2023 camping attendance information and 2024 NCAP Intent to Operate for your long-term camp(s) and all camp property(s) that your council operates. All councils, no matter if you operate a long-term camp or not, must complete the camping attendance information request form portion of the submission form.

The National Camp Accreditation Program (NCAP) requires all camp properties and long-term camps to submit an "Intent to Operate" each year. This required process (see NCAP Standard AO-802) is critical to planning for a successful camping operation. The 2023 "camping attendance report" and 2024 Intent to Operate(s) information must be submitted online no later than October 31, 2023.

2024 NCAP Standards to be Released No Later Than 10/31/2023

The 2024 National Camp Accreditation Program standards will be released no later than 10/31. 2024 updates include updated standards related to scuba programs, required training for pistol programs, latrine and shower house supervision to verify privacy expectations are met in existing facilities, and several other standard updates. In addition, please review NCAP Circular No.18 for information regarding youth protection policies as well as a new standard requirement for 2025 for sleeping/changing areas related to privacy for changing as well as bunkbed safety.
